# CDFA ANNOUNCES PUBLIC REVIEW AND COMMENT PERIOD FOR THE DRAFT PROGRAM ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT (PEIR) FOR CANNABIS CULTIVATION



SACRAMENTO, June 15, 2017 – The California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) has prepared a Draft Program Environmental Impact Report (PEIR) outlining potential environmental effects associated with the adoption and implementation of statewide cannabis cultivation regulations. CDFA is developing regulations for statewide medical and adult-use (non-medical) cannabis cultivation licensing, as well as a track-and-trace system. This system will record the movement of cannabis and cannabis products through the supply chain, from cultivation to sale.

The Draft PEIR, released in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), triggers a 45-day public review and comment period to allow agencies and interested parties the opportunity to provide input on the environmental analyses, mitigation measures, and alternatives associated with statewide cannabis cultivation. The Legal Notice for the Draft PEIR is available at calcannabis.cdfa.ca.gov

CDFA has scheduled four public workshops in July to provide the public and regulatory agencies an opportunity to ask questions and submit comments on the draft PEIR. CDFA will serve as the lead agency pursuant to CEQA and will consider public comments regarding the scope and content of the information included in the PEIR.

### CCA will urge Trump Administration to Review National Monuments within California

On April 26, President Trump signed an Executive Order calling for review of National Monument designations made under the Antiquities Act since 1996 by presidents Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Barack Obama.

In furtherance of the Executive Order, the Department of the Interior has issued a request for public comment seeking information about which National Monument designations should be reviewed and reconsidered. The deadline for public comment is July 10, and CCA will be submitting substantial comments detailing the negative impacts that National Monument designations under the Antiquities Act have had upon grazing.

While the Antiquities Act was originally intended to protect "historic landmarks, historic and prehistoric structures, [and] other objects of historic or scientific interest," recent presidents have instead used the Act to bypass Congress and local communities to place heavy restrictions on massive areas of land. President Obama used the Antiquities Act more than any previous president-locking up 256 million acres of land and water in 30 separate designations.

CCA has long opposed such designations, because they often form a basis for removal or curtailment of livestock grazing.
