Study: Trump Tariffs to Cost an Estimated 24,000 Agriculture Jobs

A study by the Trade Partnership estimates that the Trump administration's steel and aluminum tariffs will cost 495,000 jobs in the United States. That figure is up from a previous estimate of 179,000 jobs. Specific to agriculture, the report estimates that tariffs will cost 24,000 jobs. The job losses, according to the study, would impact the services, manufacturing and agricultural sectors. The new report says the updated figure takes into account threats of retaliation from other countries, as well as the expectations that Canada, Mexico and Australia will be exempt from the tariffs. The bulk of the losses are expected in the services sector, including construction, transportation, trade and others. However, the report says the tariffs would boost employment in the steel and the aluminum sectors by 26,000 jobs. The numbers show that 18 jobs would be lost for every steel/aluminum job gained. Meanwhile, some trade experts don't expect the tariffs to last long because the tariffs have an overwhelming U.S. and global unpopularity.

Livestock Organizations Seek Additional Delay for ELD Compliance

On March 8 a coalition of agricultural organizations, including CCA and NCBA, filed a new petition with the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) requesting the current waiver exempting agricultural haulers from the mandated use of an electronic logging device (ELD) be extended. On November 20, 2017, the FMCSA issued a 90-day waiver for those hauling agricultural commodities to comply with federal hours of service rules using an ELD. The ELD regulation was implemented December 18, 2017 thus the waiver for agricultural haulers is set to expire on March 18.

As of press time, FMCSA has still not ruled on the original petition filed by NCBA and the National Pork Producers Council on October 31, 2017.

Federal law grants the Secretary of Transportation the authority to provide an exemption from a rule or regulation promulgated by FMCSA for up to five years. Stay tuned to CCA's Legislative Bulletin for immediate updates regarding any decision made by FMCSA prior to March 18th to rule on the petition or grant a new extension of the waiver.

SWRCB Releases Supplemental Extension of Time Forms

On January 1, CCA-sponsored AB 589 (Bigelow) formally took effect. AB 589 allows diverters of 100 acre-feet of water per year or more to take a UC Cooperative Extension course and self-certify as a "qualified individual" for purposes of installing, calibrating and certifying a water diversion measurement device required by SB 88 (2015) and the Emergency Regulation for Measuring and Reporting the Diversion of Water adopted by the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) in 2016.

Most diverters of 100 acre-feet or more were required to install a measurement device between January 1 and July 1, 2017. Many of these diverters requested extensions of time, most of which expired January 1, 2018 or shortly thereafter. Because AB 589 courses had not been developed by January 1, this raised the specter of noncompliance (and accompanying fines) for many diverters. The SWRCB's response was that those whose extensions of time had expired should file a Supplemental Request for Additional Time. Unfortunately, the SWRCB was slow to roll out the forms necessary for filing those Supplemental Requests.

Last Tuesday, however, the SWRCB announced that the Supplemental Request for Additional Time form is finally available on the Board's Water Right Form and Survey Submittal Portal here. According to the SWRCB, those who previously filed extension of time requests should file the Supplemental Request if they intend to take a UCCE measurement course

to be deemed a "qualified individual." CCA recommends requesting at least an additional 6 months' time to ensure that you'll have sufficient time to take the UCCE course and to install your measurement device.

The SWRCB also notes that the Supplemental Request is available for those not intending to take the self-certification course but who wish to revise their requests because they need more time to comply than initially authorized by the SWRCB. (Those who require an extension of time but have not previously filed a request should file an initial Request for Additional Time.)

The SWRCB has not formally announced when SWRCB-approved AB 589 courses will be available for diverters to self-certify as qualified to install their measuring devices, but anticipates the courses will become available in "the first half of 2018." CCA will keep you updated on the development and availability of these courses.

Reminder: 2017 Water Reports Due April 1 for Many Diversions

Under the Emergency Regulation for Measuring and Reporting the Diversion of Water adopted by the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) in 2016, all water rights holders diverting water under a permit, license, registration or certificate must file their 2017 annual use reports by April 1, regardless of the size of those diversions (those filing Statements of Diversion and Use for riparian and pre-1914 rights have until July 1 to file). The reports must be made electronically using the Board's Water Right Form and Survey Submittal Portal here. Failure to file water use reports by April 1 may subject diverters to fines of up to \$500 per day.

For diverters of more than 10 acre-feet per year (who are required to install a measurement device under the regulations), the measurement provisions

of the regulations were phased in between January 1, 2017 and January 1, 2018 depending on the size and type of the diversion. If you were not required to have a measurement device installed during portions of 2017, or if you were granted an extension of time to install a measuring device, you may estimate the quantity of water diverted based on your experience and knowledge of the diversion.

Department of the Interior Recommends \$33.3 Million in Water Infrastructure Spending

On February 23, in a report to the House and Senate Appropriations Committees, the U.S. Department of the Interior recommended providing \$33.3 million for water infrastructure projects, primarily in California, pursuant to the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation (WIIN) Act. Of the seven projects specified in the proposal, four are California projects. These include the Shasta Dam and Reservoir Enlargement Project, Sites Reservoir Storage Project, Upper San Joaquin River Basin Storage Investigation and the Friant-Kern Canal Subsidence Challenges Project. This funding would allow the progress of these long overdue California water projects.

The WIIN Act, signed into law in 2016, prioritized surface water storage and delivery infrastructure. The Act provides the Secretary of the Interior, Ryan Zinke, the authority to participate in Federally-owned and State-led water storage projects.

This recommendation represents good news and the possibility of improved water infrastructure to often parched California.

- RFP P2018102: Approximately 297 acres within the Lake Earl
 Wildlife area in Del Norte County (Event ID 8614)
- RFP P2018103: Approximately 70 acres located on the Salt River Unit of the Eel River Wildlife Area in Humboldt County (Event ID 8617)
